

The Tree House

Topic: Adventure/Leisure Curriculum link: Study of Society Text type: Recount/Description Reading level: 13 Word count: 322 Vocabulary: birthday, branches, decorate, ladder, pirates, poles, pretended, ramp, relay, sweet, underneath Possible literacy focus: • Identifying the features of a recount.

- Identifying adjectives: long, old, safe, strong.
- Identifying words with double letters: all, balloons, different, hidden, ladder, running, tree.
- Understanding the text at the literal level.

Follow-up activities

Discussion and reflection

Ask the children:

Why do you think the children like playing in the tree house?

What is the tree house built on?

How do you think they protected the tree when they built the tree house?

Why didn't they just build the tree house straight onto the tree?

What are some of the features of the tree house? What did they do at the birthday party?

Imagine if ...

Ask the children to imagine what it would be like if they were able to play in the tree house in the story. What would they do? What games would they like to play? Ask them to write about this and then share their writing with the class.

Understanding text structure – Recount Description

Explore the structure of a recount description with the children. In *The Tree House* the first part of the text is a description of the tree house written mainly in the present tense. The second part of the text involves a recount of the girl's pirate birthday party in the tree house. This is written in the past tense as she is recounting the events of the day. A recount usually starts with a beginning, followed by a series of events, and then finishes with a conclusion, which may be a personal comment.

Use the chart below to show children how this text is structured. Discuss the book with the children and fill in the chart. Display this in the classroom.
