Topic: Things and places

Possible literacy focus:

Understanding the use of words with opposite meaning.

Using pictures to support and extend understanding of the text.

Identifying and defining a sentence.

Follow-up activities

Summary chart

Look back through the book with the children and talk about what each object is made from. Talk about how the hardness or softness of the material suits its use. Compile a chart.

Add other soft and hard things to the list, e.g. soft and hard brushes, soft and hard toys. Ask children if there are reasons why soft things are made from certain materials and why hard things are made of certain materials.

Applying knowledge

Show children a range of objects that are either hard or soft (e.g. ruler, cushion, cotton wool, book, paper clip, pencil). Ask the children to categorise these objects as soft or hard. Discuss what each object is made of. Ask: *What would happen if the cushion was hard? Could you use a soft pencil?*

Have the children draw the objects in order from hardest to softest. Discuss the order children choose and their reasons for doing so.

Make and break

Provide magnetic letters and boards and show the children how to build words on the rime 'at' (as in 'hat').

Have the children use the letters to form new words: cat, bat, fat, sat.

Children could record and illustrate these words.

They could explore making and breaking other words from the text:

ball – call, fall, hall, mall, stall, tall, wall.
