

Follow-up activities

Discuss

After reading the book, ask the children: Who has seen any of these plants before? Where? Are there other plants that could be included in this book? What are they?

Did any of the information surprise you? What? What was the author trying to explain to his audience? How did the author present the information? What parts of the book did you find interesting? Apart from the text and pictures, what else helped you find information in this book?

What extra information would you like to know about this topic?

Innovate on the text

Ask the children to make their own books. They can use the structure of *Dangerous Plants*, but they can call it *Dangerous Animals*. For example:

This tiger is dangerous. It has sharp teeth that can bite you. Stay away from this tiger.

Encourage children to draw the animal and label the part of the animal that is dangerous.

Helpful plants

Encourage children to think beyond the text as they compare what they have learned about dangerous plants with what they know about plants that can be helpful to us. *Are all plants dangerous? Are there some plants that are helpful to us?* Ask the children to browse through other books about plants to get ideas. With the children, fill in a chart like the one
